



Christ Church C.E. Primary School- Collective Worship Policy

This policy is intended to ensure consistency across the school in terms of Collective Worship. It is intended to be read in conjunction with the Religious Education policy and with guidance produced by the Church of England on Collective Worship (latest published in 2021 [Latest Collective Worship guidance](#)).

The Church of England states that Collective worship in a Church of England school will do the following:

- Explore the school's vision and how that underpins shared values and virtues. In doing so, it will reflect on moral values such as compassion, gratitude, justice, humility, forgiveness and reconciliation; and develop virtues such as resilience, determination and creativity that develop character and contribute to academic progress.
- Help pupils and adults to appreciate the relevance of faith in today's world by encountering the teachings of Jesus and the Bible and developing understanding of the Christian belief in the trinitarian nature of God.
- Offer the opportunity, without compulsion, to all pupils and adults to grow spiritually through experiences of prayer, stillness, worship and reflection.
- Enable all pupils and adults to appreciate that Christians worship in different ways, for example using music, silence, story, prayer, reflection, as well as through the varied liturgical and other traditions of Anglican worship, festivals and, where appropriate, the Eucharist.
- Enable pupils to develop skills through engaging in the planning, leading and evaluation of collective worship in ways that lead to improving practice.

Agreed Procedure:

- Acts of worship at Christ Church CE Primary School must be of a **broadly Christian character**, reflecting the broad traditions of **Christian belief**, and have regard for the **age, aptitude and family background** of pupils
- Formal Collective Worship – children are encouraged to plan & lead worship on a regular basis, this takes place within classrooms and through the School Worship Council.

Monday- Seesaw (Seesaw is an online application platform) worship time led by Mrs Amy Martin focusing on encouraging reflection and response – children have Reflection Journals

Tuesday- Seesaw worship time using Hereford Diocese weekly materials led by Mr Mark Harrington from Diocese

Wednesday- Seesaw worship time led by the headteacher and/or by pupils with a focus on the Christian value or a festival. Once a half term there is a School Council meeting. One of the four school councils, Worship Council actively evaluates and monitors the Worship of the school.

Thursday- Whole school worship in the Hall- focusing on the Christian value of the month, the liturgical year or a festival led by Rev Sam Mann from the local deanery.

Friday- Whole school celebration worship in the Hall- led by the headteacher with parents invited to participate when their children have won awards.

- Worship themes are chosen to reflect the school's Christian Values, the seasons, special events in the life of the school and community, Christian festivals together with festivals and values from other religions. Topical events e.g. natural disasters in the news, saint's days, charity appeals, Book Week, outside guests etc are included as appropriate.
- A song of praise or hymn chosen in conjunction with the weekly theme will be sung during the time of worship and pupils and staff will be invited to take part in prayers. The following phrases may be used: Now I'm going to say a prayer and if you want to make it your prayer, say Amen at the end; The Lord be with you, pupils respond: And also with you. Other liturgical responses may also be used where appropriate.
- Silence may be used to reflect on the issue explored rather than voicing a prayer in words
- Pupils will be encouraged to share their thoughts, feelings and ideas
- Pupils will be encouraged to participate in an active way by joining with singing and prayers, making music, reading chosen passages or their own prayers and dramatising chosen stories
- Music is used and part of a worship time may involve listening to a piece of music which has inspired others. This serves to set the mood for spiritual development when children may reflect on their own beliefs and those of others.
- Parents retain the right to withdraw their children from collective worship
- Teachers and headteachers retain their right not to participate in acts of worship but we actively encourage all to attend
- Opportunities to take part in festivals and church special days such as ashing at Ash Wednesday and joining in sharing bread during Holy Week to understand the Last Supper, are provided
- The children regularly monitor and evaluate our worship life as part of Worship Council

Is this working?

- Is our collective worship inclusive, inspiring and invitational?
- Do visitors to our worship time feel the sense of our school as a caring community?
- Do the children value our times of collective worship?
- Are the children proud to stand up and celebrate in worship time?
- Do the children actively involve themselves at worship time?

Our Christian Values

As a church school Christ Church aims to develop its religious character taking into account the principles of the Church of England and to promote Christian values through the experience we offer to all our pupils.

Our Christian values run through everything we do and they guide us in our decision making and our future plans. They support us in delivering our vision. Our eleven Christian values were carefully chosen after consulting with our school community including, pupils, staff, parents and governors.

Our Christian values, include the fundamental British Values of democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty, and mutual respect and tolerance of those with different faiths & beliefs and include our School Golden Rules.
